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Delimitation after Census 2027 may reshape parliamentary representation while testing India's federal balance and democratic equality

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Recent Developments:

- The **Census 2027** is being conducted in a new digital framework, and its population data is expected to become central to the next delimitation exercise. The Census authorities have notified the first-phase houselisting period from **1 April to 30 September 2026**, while population enumeration will follow in the second phase.
- The Election Commission of India states that the **present parliamentary constituencies are based on the 2001 Census** and that delimitation of constituencies is constitutionally deferred until the **first Census after 2026**.
- On **16 April 2026**, the Government introduced the **Constitution (131st Amendment) Bill, 2026**, the **Delimitation Bill, 2026**, and the **Union Territories Laws (Amendment) Bill, 2026** in the Lok Sabha.
- The proposed constitutional amendment sought to modify the framework governing delimitation and representation, while the Delimitation Bill proposed a new **Delimitation Commission** and repeal of the **Delimitation Act, 2002**.
- The **Constitution (131st Amendment) Bill, 2026** was **negatived by the Lok Sabha on 17 April 2026**; consequently, the proposed 2026 legislative framework did not become law.
- The debate nevertheless remains significant because the constitutional freeze on inter-State allocation of Lok Sabha seats is linked to the **first Census after 2026**, making the **Census 2027** a potential trigger for a major reconfiguration of political representation.

What is Delimitation?

- **Delimitation** is the statutory process of fixing or redrawing the territorial boundaries of **Lok Sabha and State Legislative Assembly constituencies** to reflect changes in population.
- Its principal objective is to maintain broadly comparable population representation across constituencies and thereby advance the democratic principle of **"one person, one vote, one value."**
- In India, delimitation is undertaken by an independent, high-powered **Delimitation Commission**, whose orders have the force of law and cannot be challenged before any court.
- The Commission's final orders are laid before the **Lok Sabha and concerned State Legislative Assemblies**, but these Houses cannot modify the orders.
- The **Election Commission of India** provides institutional and technical assistance during the delimitation process, while the Commission conducts the actual readjustment.

Constitutional and Legal Framework:

Constitutional Provisions:

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- **Article 81:** Provides for the composition of the Lok Sabha and envisages allocation of seats among States broadly in proportion to their population, subject to constitutional qualifications.
- **Article 82:** Requires Parliament to provide by law for the readjustment of Lok Sabha seats and territorial constituencies after each Census, subject to the constitutional framework in force.
- **Article 170:** Provides for the composition and territorial division of State Legislative Assemblies and links their readjustment to the Census-based delimitation framework.
- **Articles 330 and 332:** Provide for reservation of seats for **Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes** in the Lok Sabha and State Legislative Assemblies, respectively, based on population-related constitutional criteria.

Constitutional Freeze on Inter-State Seat Allocation:

- The **42nd Constitutional Amendment Act, 1976** froze the allocation of Lok Sabha seats among States and the total strength of State Legislative Assemblies on the basis of the **1971 Census**.
- The freeze was intended to ensure that States adopting **family planning and population stabilisation** measures were not politically penalised through a reduction in their parliamentary representation.
- The **84th Constitutional Amendment Act, 2001** extended the freeze on inter-State allocation of seats until the first Census conducted after **2026**, while permitting limited readjustment of constituencies within States.
- The **87th Constitutional Amendment Act, 2003** enabled the readjustment of constituencies within States using **2001 Census** population figures without altering the total number of seats allocated to each State.
- Consequently, the present parliamentary constituency structure reflects a combination of **1971-based inter-State seat allocation** and subsequent internal constituency readjustment based on newer Census data.

History of Delimitation in India:

Major Delimitation Commissions:

- **1952 Commission:** It was constituted under the **Delimitation Commission Act, 1952**, using the 1951 Census, and undertook the first post-Independence delimitation.
- **1963 Commission:** It was constituted under the **Delimitation Commission Act, 1962**, following the 1961 Census and the reorganisation of States.
- **1973 Commission:** It was constituted under the **Delimitation Act, 1972**, using the 1971 Census and contributed to the subsequent parliamentary constituency framework.
- **2002 Commission:** It was constituted under the **Delimitation Act, 2002**, using the 2001 Census for internal constituency readjustment. The Election Commission records these as the four Delimitation Commissions constituted in India.

Why Delimitation after 2026 Matters:

Restoring Representative Equality:

- Population growth has occurred at different rates across States, resulting in substantial differences in the population represented by individual Members of Parliament.
- A fresh delimitation can reduce such disparities by creating constituencies with more comparable populations.
- It can therefore strengthen the democratic principle of **equal value of votes**.

Reflecting Demographic Changes:

- Since the last major population benchmark used for inter-State allocation was the **1971 Census**, India has experienced substantial demographic, economic and spatial transformation.
- Rapid **urbanisation, migration, fertility decline and regional demographic divergence** have altered the geographical distribution of population.

- A new delimitation can therefore align political representation more closely with contemporary demographic realities.

Women's Political Representation:

- The **106th Constitutional Amendment Act, 2023**, popularly associated with the **Nari Shakti Vandan Adhiniyam**, provides for one-third reservation for women in the Lok Sabha and State Legislative Assemblies.
- Its implementation is constitutionally linked to a **delimitation exercise following the publication of the relevant Census figures**.
- Therefore, the post-2026 delimitation process has implications not only for territorial representation but also for the implementation of women's reservation.

Recalibration of SC/ST Representation:

- Delimitation can require readjustment of constituencies reserved for **Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes** in accordance with updated population patterns and constitutional provisions.
- This can improve the geographical distribution of reserved constituencies and potentially strengthen descriptive representation.

Major Challenges:

Federal Imbalance and Population Control:

- The principal controversy arises from the possibility that States with **lower fertility rates** and stronger population stabilisation may receive a smaller proportion of the total Lok Sabha seats than their present share.
- Conversely, States with relatively higher population growth may gain a larger number of seats.
- This creates a tension between **democratic equality based on population** and **federal fairness based on the principle of not penalising successful population stabilisation**.

North-South Political Representation:

- Southern States have generally achieved lower fertility rates and faster demographic stabilisation than several northern States.
- A population-based redistribution could therefore alter the relative political weight of different regions in the Lok Sabha.
- The issue has consequently acquired a strong **North-South federal dimension** involving representation, fiscal contributions, development outcomes and political influence.

Representation versus Population Stabilisation:

- The existing freeze was partly designed to incentivise States to pursue **family planning and population control**.
- A subsequent redistribution purely according to population could create the perception that States which achieved demographic stabilisation are being politically disadvantaged.
- The challenge is therefore to reconcile **representative democracy** with **demographic responsibility**.

Risk of Gerrymandering:

- Although delimitation is assigned to an independent Commission, constituency boundary design can have major political consequences.
- **Cracking** refers to dispersing a particular voter group across several constituencies to reduce its electoral influence.

- **Packing** refers to concentrating a voter group into a limited number of constituencies, potentially reducing its influence elsewhere.
- Transparent criteria, public consultation and objective geographical principles are therefore essential to preserve electoral legitimacy.

Administrative and Political Complexity:

- A major increase in the number of constituencies would require extensive restructuring of **electoral rolls, polling infrastructure, administrative boundaries and parliamentary functioning**.
- The process would also require coordination among the Union Government, Election Commission, State authorities and the Census organisation.

2026 Delimitation Proposal and Its Significance:

Proposed Delimitation Commission:

- The **Delimitation Bill, 2026**, introduced on 16 April 2026, proposed constitution of a Delimitation Commission for readjusting Lok Sabha and State Legislative Assembly seats.
- The proposed Commission was to consist of a **Chairperson who is or has been a Supreme Court Judge, the Chief Election Commissioner or an Election Commissioner nominated by the Chief Election Commissioner**, and the **State Election Commissioner of the concerned State**.
- The Bill also proposed **associate members** from each State to assist the Commission in its work.
- The proposal was intended to replace the existing legislative framework under the **Delimitation Act, 2002**, but the associated constitutional amendment did not secure passage.

Proposed Change in Representation:

- The proposed constitutional framework sought to restore population-based readjustment of seats after the relevant Census.
- The debate centred on whether a new population-based allocation would significantly alter the present balance of parliamentary representation among States.
- The issue became particularly contentious because the proposed changes were linked with the implementation of **women's reservation** and the future size and composition of the Lok Sabha.

Delimitation and Federalism:

Why Federalism is at Stake:

- The Indian Constitution combines **representative democracy** with a **federal distribution of political power**.
- Lok Sabha representation based strictly on population promotes electoral equality but can alter the relative influence of States.
- Excessive concentration of parliamentary representation in high-population States could strengthen demographic majoritarianism within the Union legislature.
- Conversely, maintaining outdated seat allocations indefinitely can weaken the principle that legislative representation should reflect population.

Role of Rajya Sabha:

- The **Rajya Sabha** represents the States and therefore provides an institutional mechanism for reflecting federal interests at the Union level.
- However, Rajya Sabha representation is also broadly linked to State population, meaning it does not completely neutralise the political consequences of Lok Sabha delimitation.

- Strengthening deliberative and federal functions of the Rajya Sabha can therefore complement any future reform of Lok Sabha representation.

Way Forward:

Build a Federal Consensus:

- The Union Government should undertake structured consultations with **States, political parties, constitutional experts and civil society** before finalising the post-2026 delimitation framework.
- A broad political consensus can reduce the perception that delimitation is merely an exercise in redistributing political power.

Balance Population and Federal Equity:

- The framework should preserve the constitutional principle of **equal representation** while considering mechanisms that prevent States from being disproportionately penalised for successful population stabilisation.
- Any transitional mechanism should remain constitutionally defensible, transparent and based on objective criteria.

Ensure Transparent Delimitation:

- The Delimitation Commission should publish clear criteria, demographic methodology and draft constituency maps.
- Extensive **public hearings and stakeholder consultations** should be conducted before final orders are issued.
- Digital mapping and **Geographic Information System-based tools** can improve accuracy, transparency and public scrutiny.

Protect Electoral Integrity:

- Boundary determination should prioritise **population equality, geographical compactness, administrative convenience, communication links and community interests**, subject to constitutional and statutory requirements.
- Strong safeguards should prevent partisan manipulation of constituency boundaries.

Link Representation with Democratic Inclusion:

- The delimitation process should facilitate effective implementation of **women's reservation** and appropriate readjustment of **SC/ST reserved constituencies**.
- Political representation should therefore address both **territorial equality** and **social inclusion**.

Delimitation versus Census:

Key Distinction:

- The **Census** determines population-related demographic information, whereas **delimitation** uses legally prescribed population data to determine the territorial and numerical framework of electoral constituencies.
- Census data therefore provides the demographic foundation, while the Delimitation Commission performs the constitutional and statutory electoral readjustment.
- The two processes are institutionally distinct but closely connected in the post-2026 context.
