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Vaishya Tekri Excavation in Ujjain Revives Debate on Ashoka, Early Buddhism and Mauryan Heritage in Malwa

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Recent Developments:

- The **Madhya Pradesh Government** has initiated fresh archaeological investigation and restoration of Buddhist monuments associated with **Ashoka** at **Vaishya Tekri in Ujjain**, renewing interest in the Mauryan presence in Malwa.
- The excavation is significant because Vaishya Tekri is described as a remarkably large stupa, while its precise **date, architectural evolution and association with Ashoka** require further archaeological confirmation.
- The initiative also highlights the need to study the **wider cultural landscape** around a stupa rather than treating the monument as an isolated structure.
- The excavation comes amid concerns over **urban expansion and industrialisation** around sites that were previously located in relatively open landscapes.

Vaishya Tekri Stupa: Archaeological Significance:

Scale and Earlier Excavations:

- According to **Peter Skilling's 2011 study**, the largest stupa at the site, popularly known as **Vaishya Tekri**, has an estimated base of about **350 feet** and a height of about **100 feet**, making it substantially larger than the approximately **54-foot Sanchi Stupa**.
- A smaller mound known as **Kumbhar or Kumhar Tekri** is located nearby, and both structures have remained comparatively undisturbed apart from modern infrastructure crossing the area.
- Excavations conducted by the **Department of Archaeology of the erstwhile Gwalior State in 1938–39** reportedly exposed large bricks and punch-marked coins, which contributed to the attribution of the structures to the **Mauryan period**.
- However, historians have cautioned that the archaeological report is several decades old and that its interpretation was influenced by earlier historical assumptions, particularly those associated with **Alexander Cunningham's writings on Ashoka**.

Why Fresh Excavation Matters:

- The present investigation can help establish a more reliable **stratigraphic sequence**, identify different construction phases and determine whether the monument was built during the Mauryan period or subsequently modified.
- Archaeological evidence can also clarify the relationship between the stupa, nearby habitation, monasteries, cemeteries and other structures associated with the **Buddhist religious landscape**.
- Scholars have therefore argued that excavation should examine the **entire cultural landscape**, rather than concentrating exclusively on the visible mound.

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Ujjain in the Mauryan Period: Strategic and Economic Importance:

Ujjayini and Avanti:

- Ancient **Ujjayini**, corresponding broadly to modern Ujjain, was situated on the **Sipra River**, a tributary of the Chambal, and served as the capital of **Avanti**.
- Avanti was one of the important **Mahajanapadas** of ancient India and developed into a major political and commercial centre before its incorporation into the Mauryan Empire.
- Archaeological evidence indicates that Ujjain had a long urban history, with fortifications appearing around the city by approximately the **7th century BCE** and Avanti emerging as a powerful kingdom by the **6th century BCE**.
- Ujjain occupied an important position on routes connecting **Pataliputra, northern India, the Deccan and western coastal ports**, strengthening its economic and administrative significance.

Ujjain as an Administrative Centre:

- The Mauryan Empire divided its extensive territory into important administrative units, with some major provinces placed under **royal princes or Kumaras**.
- Evidence from Ashoka's inscriptions refers to a **prince stationed at Ujjain**, supporting the historical tradition that Ashoka served as its viceroy before becoming emperor.
- The tradition is also preserved in Buddhist chronicles, although details concerning Ashoka's early career must be assessed critically because later Buddhist literature contains both historical information and religious embellishment.

Ashoka's Viceroyalty at Ujjain: Historical Evidence:

Literary and Epigraphic Sources:

- According to the **Mahavamsa**, Bindusara appointed Ashoka as viceroy of Avanti, with Ujjain functioning as his headquarters.
- Ashoka's own inscriptions provide an important corroborative element because they refer to a **Kumara at Ujjain**, indicating the existence of a princely administrative authority there.
- The **SarMarinscription** is also relevant to Ashoka's early life because it records his presence as a prince in central India.
- Therefore, the claim that Ashoka had an administrative association with Ujjain has a stronger evidentiary basis than the claim that he personally commissioned the **Vaishya Tekri stupa**.

Duration and Significance:

- Historians generally associate Ashoka with a substantial period of service in **Avanti**, following his earlier association with Taxila.
- Ujjain's importance as a major urban, commercial and administrative centre would have made the viceroyalty significant for a Mauryan prince preparing for imperial responsibilities.
- The city therefore provides an important context for understanding Ashoka **before his accession**, rather than only his later identity as a Buddhist emperor.

Ashoka and Vidisha: Devi and the Buddhist Connection:

Meeting with Devi:

- Buddhist traditions associate Ashoka's journey to Ujjain with **Vidisha**, where he is said to have met **Devi**, the daughter of a merchant.
- The couple are traditionally associated with **Mahinda and Sanghamitta**, who later became important figures in the transmission of Buddhism to Sri Lanka.

- The official Vidisha district history also preserves the tradition that Ashoka met Devi while travelling from **Pataliputra to Ujjain**.
- However, historians caution that details concerning the precise nature of Ashoka's relationship with Devi derive substantially from later Buddhist traditions and should therefore be distinguished from firmly established epigraphic evidence.

Vidisha's Strategic Location:

- Vidisha was located along the route connecting the eastern Gangetic heartland with **Ujjain and western India**, making it an important node in the political and commercial geography of ancient central India.
- The close geographical relationship between **Vidisha, Sanchi and Ujjain** also helps explain the emergence of a major Buddhist cultural zone in the region.

Vaishya Tekri, Kumhar Tekri and Buddhist Traditions:

Vaishya Tekri and Devi:

- Local Sri Lankan traditions associate **Vaishya Tekri** with Devi, with the name being linked traditionally to her merchant-family background.
- Such traditions are useful for understanding the **memory and cultural reception** of Ashoka but cannot independently establish the archaeological identity or date of the monument.

Kumhar Tekri and the 'Hell' Tradition:

- **Xuanzang**, the Chinese Buddhist pilgrim who visited India in the **7th century CE**, recorded a tradition concerning a stupa at Ujjain associated with a place where Ashoka had established a **"hellish prison."**
- Earlier excavations at **Kumhar Tekri** reportedly identified a burial-cum-cremation context dating to approximately the **3rd century BCE**, which has been discussed in relation to Xuanzang's account.
- This association illustrates how archaeological remains, local traditions and later pilgrimage accounts can intersect, but such correlations must be tested through independent archaeological evidence.

Archaeology and Historical Method: Why Caution Is Necessary:

Monumental Scale Does Not Establish Attribution:

- The enormous dimensions of Vaishya Tekri make it historically significant, but **size alone cannot prove that Ashoka commissioned the structure**.
- Establishing an Ashokan attribution requires convergence among **stratigraphy, artefacts, inscriptions, architectural features, chronology and comparative evidence**.
- The absence of a known **Ashokan pillar or inscription at Vaishya Tekri or elsewhere in Ujjain** is therefore an important limitation when making direct claims about Ashoka's construction activities.

Importance of Landscape Archaeology:

- Archaeologists have emphasised that stupas generally formed part of wider religious complexes containing **smaller stupas, monasteries, cemeteries and other structures**.
- Excavations around **Sanchi** demonstrate the value of studying the broader archaeological landscape, including burial contexts associated with Buddhist teachers.
- A landscape-level investigation at Vaishya Tekri could therefore reveal the **development, organisation and changing use of the Buddhist complex over several centuries**.

Mauryan Architecture and Buddhist Heritage: UPSC Relevance:

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Mauryan Architectural Features:

- Mauryan architecture is associated with important developments in **stone architecture, polished sandstone, pillars, stupas and monumental construction**.
- **Ashokan pillars**, characterised by highly polished stone shafts and distinctive capitals, represent an important achievement of Mauryan craftsmanship.
- Buddhist stupas became important architectural expressions of **relic worship, commemoration and the expansion of Buddhist institutions**.
- The **Sanchi complex** provides one of the most important surviving examples of the evolution of Buddhist architecture in central India.

Court Art and Popular Art:

- Mauryan artistic traditions are often discussed through the distinction between **court-associated monumental art** and **popular or non-courtly artistic traditions**.
- Court-associated art includes imperial pillars, palace architecture and monumental stone works, while popular traditions are reflected through **terracotta objects, local sculpture and everyday material culture**.
- The Vaishya Tekri excavation can potentially contribute to understanding the interaction between **imperial patronage and local Buddhist traditions**.

Historical Significance of the Excavation:

Understanding Early Buddhism in Malwa:

- The excavation can contribute to understanding how **Buddhist institutions developed in Malwa** and how religious networks interacted with major urban and commercial centres.
- Ujjain's position on long-distance trade routes makes it particularly useful for studying the relationship between **trade, urbanisation and religious patronage**.
- Evidence from associated structures may help determine whether the site developed primarily during the Mauryan period or underwent significant expansion during later periods.

Revisiting Ashoka's Early Career:

- The excavation provides an opportunity to distinguish between the **historically demonstrable aspects of Ashoka's Ujjain connection** and traditions that developed around his memory.
- His association with Ujjain as a prince has comparatively stronger literary and epigraphic support, whereas his direct connection with Vaishya Tekri remains an **archaeological hypothesis requiring further evidence**.
- This distinction is important for UPSC because historical reconstruction requires **source criticism rather than accepting literary traditions as literal archaeological facts**.

Conservation Challenges and Way Forward:

Threat from Urbanisation:

- The archaeological landscape around Ujjain faces increasing pressure from **urban expansion and industrial development**, which can damage archaeological deposits even when monumental structures remain visible.
- Archaeological conservation should therefore integrate **heritage protection, land-use planning and controlled development**.

Way Forward:

- The excavation should employ **modern archaeological techniques**, including systematic stratigraphic excavation, scientific dating, material analysis, archaeobotany and spatial mapping wherever appropriate.

- Archaeological findings should be correlated with **epigraphic, numismatic, literary and environmental evidence** before assigning definitive historical conclusions.
- Conservation should protect not only Vaishya Tekri but also associated archaeological features and the wider **cultural landscape of ancient Ujjain**.
- Public interpretation should clearly distinguish between **established evidence, scholarly inference and local tradition**.
